Greetings from a little community in rural Haiti where ASAPH students recently helped me to celebrate my birthday! It was a delightful evening of music and memories...and a little food as well. The church's worship team had celebrated with me the day before. It's good to feel appreciated, and I certainly do.



People here are hungry. Life is hard in Haiti, and it's getting harder. International organizations have been talking about helping Haiti in the fight against the gangs. That might open the roads and allow circulation of supplies again, bringing prices down. Sadly, Haiti has a way of somehow managing to avoid improvements like these. With the number of crises this world is following right now, Haiti is low on the list of priorities.

I remain called to be here. I enjoy being with people through these struggles, and relish the moments when my experience can give a little courage and hope. God is faithful.

ASAPH Leadership Training

Here at ASAPH, we have a monthly meeting where I sit with our young leaders (teachers, coaches, committee members...) to develop leadership skills. It's working!

As summer came to a close, two young ASAPH soccer coaches organized a trip to the beach for our Junior soccer team. They made plans for food and activities. They prepared the players, and they led the whole thing...complete with a DJ, games, juice and spaghetti. The young players age 11 to 17 had a great time. It was valuable team building.

I was impressed with the leadership of the two young coaches. They are teenagers themselves, but they grew up playing with AAF and understand our mission. They successfully created a fun, safe environment for 24 boys. Not surprisingly, the team won its next game.

The ASAPH Brass Band committee oversaw a four-day band camp as summer ended as well. The committee managed the whole camp without a single serious discipline issue. That is a testimony to good leadership from the committee of leaders.

Food Production

A recent border dispute between Haiti and the Dominican Republic exaggerated the lack of supplies here on our end of the island. Gangs had already cut the supply chain down to a trickle for the past few years. The recent dispute over a canal led the DR to close the border completely. Much of Haiti's food supply comes across that border every day. So, prices went higher yet and even more food items were nowhere to be found.

All of this is one more reason for local food production to increase. Farmers in our area often lack water needed to produce food. *Courtois Erntz (WEC)*, with ASAPH's help, is making irrigation equipment (suction hose, pump, PVC) available at reasonable cost for a few farmers who are working land close to WEC's own gardens. Five or six cultivators have been watering their projects for 20 or 30 hours at a time.

That means more local food for people and animals. More food means better health, more productive people, and increased smiles.

Food production in Haiti comes with great risk. Below on the left is a banana tree. The yellow arrow points to a stalk where a thief cut off bunches of bananas like the ones on the top of the page. Below on the right, you can see a planting project that was destroyed over night by a neighbor's pig who escaped from his pen and made a costly mess.
