ASAPH'S BUDGET 2021 Asaph Teaching Ministry is grateful for eight full years of productive ministry that depended on support from sponsors like you. As we look to 2021 and our 9th year, things are tenuous. Before the dramatic events of 2020, the ministry's income was already on a bit of a downward trend. COVID 19 has changed contribution levels for every ministry...ASAPH included. On top of those issues, Haiti's government has manipulated the exchange rate making every US dollar worth about half of what it was worth just a couple of months ago.

In October and November, we tried to quickly adapt to the new financial situation. In a budget that was already lean, we eliminated all 'excess' and held on only to the most necessary of items. Some ministries have already been reduced. In October and November I informed many students that ASAPH would be unable to assist them in covering some of their academic expenses. It is a tough moment, but life here is pretty full of tough moments. God is faithful!

As a missionary looking to the future, I am willing to adapt to any situation God sends. I am willing to reduce and adapt, and perhaps begin making ASAPH better prepared for the long-term future (without Andy). BUT, I want to share these details with each of you as well because you are such a part of ASAPH's ministry here in Pasbwadòm.

As always, we invite you to share with ASAPH as God allows you to do so. We will continue to do ministry here with the tools already in our hands. We are also more motivated than ever to seek ways to support the ministries of ASAPH from right here in Haiti. Keep us and our future ministry in your regular prayers. We trust Him for every thing...all day, every day!
